Trinity

Preparing

Prelude: Allegro moderato e serioso, from Organ Sonata No. 1 – Felix Mendelssohn

The host says:

God, who created the fields of Eden, takes delight in all things, including us!

We join in reading the bold type.

God of glory, God of grace, your name is exalted in all the earth!

Christ, who walked the streets of our world, gives hope to all people, including us!

God of glory, God of grace, your Son is Savior of all creation!

God's Spirit, who stays in our hearts, bears truth and peace to us!

God of glory, God of grace,

your love surrounds our every moment.1

The host briefly shares announcements.

Inviting

The liturgist continues:

O blessed Trinity, in whom we know the Maker of all things seen and unseen, the Savior of all both near and far:
By your Spirit enable us so to worship your divine majesty that with all the company of heaven we may magnify your glorious name, saying:
Holy, holy, holy,
Glory to you, O Lord most high.²

Amen.

The cantor sings (to the tune of Hymn #71):³

Come now, Almighty God, help us your name to laud; our songs we raise: Ruler all glorious, o'er all victorious, come and reign over us, Ancient of Days!

We join the cantor:

Come now, Incarnate Word, by heaven and earth adored; our prayer attend: Come, and your people bless, and give your word success; grant us your holiness Savior and Friend!

Come, Holy Comforter, your sacred witness bear in this glad hour: your grace to us impart, now rule in every heart, never from us depart, Spirit of power!

Praying

The liturgist continues:

Created as stewards of all creation, we know how often we have sunk to depths of faithless living. We lack the stamina to follow Christ through the Kingdom, and ignore the Spirit's calls to justice. Yet, God looks into our souls and sees the delight of God's heart. Let us join in prayer to the One who does not disappoint us.

God of glory, grace and wisdom, you call to us, but we do not listen. We trust in the emptiness of the world,

but are reluctant to hope in your Word.

We boast in our successes, but ignore the sufferings of others.

Justice is what we demand for lawbreakers, instead of it becoming a lifestyle for ourselves.

We contemplate our sin and God's grace.

Poured into our hearts, God's love gives us new life and hope. Touched by the fingers of God, we are restored to new life.

This is good news! God loves us, God forgives us, God calls us to service! Thanks be to God. Amen.⁴

The liturgist may remind us of special blessings, needs and concerns, and then says:

I invite you to kneel as we pray.

Our holy Guardian God, hallowed be your name.

Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors.

Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and glory are yours now and forever.

Amen.

open our eyes to the possibilities of grace
and healing for us and for our communities.

May your love be with us all.

Let us each pray for strength.

We pray silently.

Liberating Savior, Redeemer of the World, enable us to hear and experience the extent and persistence of your love.

Let us each give thanks for the assurance that we are redeemed.

We pray silently.

Sustaining Presence, our best Comforter, lead us into opportunities to comfort others in our homes and our communities.

May your love be with us all.

The lector says:

Listen to the word of God from Proverbs, chapter 8, verses 1-4 and 22-31.

After a period of silent reflection on the reading, the host says:

Please join in reading from Psalm 8.

1 O Lord, our Lord,

how exalted is your Name in all the world!

- Out of the mouths of infants and children your majesty is praised above the heavens.
 You have set up a stronghold against your adversaries,
 - to quell the enemy and the avenger.
- When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars you have set in their courses,
- What are mortals that you should be mindful of us? mere humans that you should seek us out?
- 5 You have made us but little lower than the angels; you adorn us with glory and honor;
- You give us mastery over the works of your hands; you put all things under our feet:
- 7 All sheep and oxen,

even the wild beasts of the field,

- 8 The birds of the air, the fish of the sea, and whatsoever walks in the paths of the sea.
- 9 O Lord, our Lord,

how exalted is your Name in all the world!

After a period of silent reflection on the Psalm, the lector says:

Listen to the word of God from Romans, chapter 5, verses 1-5.

After a period of silent reflection on the reading, the cantor says:

Please stand and join me in singing ___ stanzas of hymn 642, "We Praise Thee With Our Minds."

The people continue standing as the liturgist continues:

Listen to the gospel according to John, chapter 16, verses 12-15.

Dedication

After a period of silent reflection, the liturgist continues:

Please be seated.

As we dedicate our lives to you, Gracious God, remind us that we are called to serve in all the places where we will find you—at the entrances to broken neighborhoods, on the heights of despair, in the valleys of injustice, at the crossroads of poverty and hunger. In all those places, may we offer not only our treasures, but our lives as well.⁵

We join the cantor in singing (to the tune of Hymn #71):⁶

To You great One in Three, eternal praises be forever more.
Your sovereign majesty may we in glory see, and to eternity love and adore.

Responding

The host says:

God,

you sent your Word to bring us truth and your Spirit to make us holy.

Through them we come to know the mystery of your life. Help us to worship you, one God in three Persons, by proclaiming and living our faith in you.

Blessing

Postlude: Allegro assai vivace, from Organ Sonata No. 1 – Felix Mendelssohn

The host says and the people respond:

Let us go now, as children of God, who is mindful of all people.

We will go to speak as simply as little children, to share songs of joy we learned as infants.

Let us go now, as siblings of Jesus, brother to the poor.

We will go to stand at the intersection of oppression and despair, to cry out for all those whose hopes have been silenced.

Let us go now, as heirs of the peace of the Spirit.

We will go to share delight with everyone we meet, to offer grace to those who have suffered most.⁸

Alleluia! Amen!
